

#### The Ubin Custom

On Pulau Ubin, we:

- greet one another with a smile
- pick up litter and take them back to the mainland
- leave plants in their natural habitats
- bear in mind that bright lights and loud sounds can startle the local animals
- frown on the use of throwaway plastic bags and bottles

#### History of Pulau Ubin

Pulau Ubin, an island off Changi, was formerly a cluster of 5 smaller islands separated by rivers. Local Malays used to call it "Pulau Bantu Ubin", or "Granite Stone Island", as granite from the island was mined and used to make floor tiles.

The earliest inhabitants of the island were the Malays from Indonesia. By the mid-1800s, a large Chinese community had moved to the island to work at the granite mines. During the 1880s, around 50 Malay families from the Kallang River in mainland Singapore moved to Pulau Ubin to be fishermen.

Granite mining activities on Pulau Ubin peaked in the 1930s and attracted many people to the island. The ten granite mining companies on the island were the main employers of the residents. Besides granite mines, there were also coffee, durian, and rubber plantations across the island. Other sources of livelihood included prawn farming, fishing and poultry rearing.

As the population grew larger, the unhappiness between the original residents and the newcomers led to the issue of maintaining social order on the island. Furthermore, a number of Chinese immigrants to the island were members of Chinese secret societies. As a result, there were frequent clashes between the different societies. The violence ended only after the Japanese occupied the island during the Second World War.

By the 1970s, the granite mining industry began to decline. The last mines on the island closed in 1999. Commercial crop farming and rubber tapping on Pulau Ubin officially ceased in the 1980s.

The population on the island gradually dwindled with the closure of granite mines. In 2016, it was recorded that 38 residents remain on Pulau Ubin.
