

Hougang MRT station was shut down for an hour on 2 April as police were called in to investigate an unattended bag.

6 SURPRISING FACTS ABOUT COFFEE



Coffee is the second most traded product on earth
According to the Global Exchange, there are approximately 25 farmers in
over 50 countries involved in producing coffee, making it the second most
traded commodity after oil, followed by natural gas and gold.

Espresso is a strong Italian coffee

Espresso is made by forcing boiling water through pressed coffee grounds. Although espresso has more caffeine per unit volume, it actually has about a third of the amount of caffeine as a regular cup of coffee because it is consumed in smaller quantities.

There are two types of coffee beans: Arabica and Robusta Seventy percent of coffee beans are Arabica. Although Robusta has twice as much caffeine, it is less popular as it is slightly more bitter.

The majority of coffee is produced in Brazil

Brazil produces 40% of the world's coffee, which is twice as much as Colombia and Vietnam which rank 2nd and 3nd respectively in coffee production.

The world's most expensive coffee costs \$300 a kilogram

It comes from the faeces of a Sumatran wild cat. The cat, called a Luwak, is unable to digest coffee beans consumed and they are fermented in the stomach. When the beans are excreted, they produce a smooth, chocolatey coffee.

Coffee drinkers have lower risks of certain diseases

Researchers have found that older patients with high levels of caffeine in their blood were more likely to avoid Alzhelmer's disease. Studies have also shown caffeine has positive effects on Type 2 diabetes and Parkinson's disease, and offers protection against skin cancer in women.



With rhythmic sweeps of its tail, the humpback whale swam along the eastern coast of Australia. The creature that weighed nearly thirty tonnes was beginning its migration to the rich feeding grounds of Antarctica, thousands of miles to the south and still many weeks away.

It had either failed to realise the shark net anchored off the coast of Australia, or it did 15 not know how to avoid it. Within seconds, the whale found itself enveloped in two hundred metres of nylon net and rope. Neither was the whale able to reverse because humpback whales cannot swim backwards nor could it swim forward because the net was firmly secured to the ocean bed by a hundred kilograms of chain and two very heavy anchors. The whale spun around and threw itself out of the water to try and break free. However, the net 10 wrapped even more tightly around its body. With its mouth, blowhole, left fin and tail bound tight, the whale struggled to rise above the water for air. Finally, using all its strength in one last bid for freedom, it thrashed again and again until one of the chains snapped and an anchor broke free. Still bound by the weight of the massive chain and the remaining anchor. the whale resumed its migratory path as if unwavering in its desire to head south.

Some time later, the marine centre in Queensland received a call that an entang humpback whale had been spotted. A rescue team consisting of a helicopter and a small boat with three divers was soon despatched. After several hours of fruitless searching, the captain of the boat received a message on his marine radio. The helicopter pilot had located the whale a little further out than expected. The pilot had also noticed that the whale was 20 not alone. Humpback whales sing to each other across vast stretches of ocean and support injured companions so the whale had been joined by three others. With four whales present, the rescue mission had suddenly become potentially far more dangerous. There was no way of knowing if the whales would turn aggressive.

As they approached the trapped whale, the divers lowered themselves into the water |25 to assess the situation. Then, suddenly, the three other giant mammals bore down on them and they braced themselves for the impact. Six feet away from them, however, the whales wheeled away gracefully, swimming underneath and around the men showing interest and appearing to be inquisitive. They did not appear to be aggressive.

The divers swam to the trapped whale's head and began slicing the net in which it [30] was caught. It was exhausting work. The weight of the chains kept the head of the whale largely under water, so the men had to dive, cut and then surface for air. Since the whale was moving forward, they had to swim to its head to start again each time. The men felt like car mechanics doing repairs to a lorry while it was motoring down the road. The whale was struggling to obtain enough air but it watched the divers intently. Its eyes, each the size of a 35 human fist, followed their every move. As the men worked, the mammal seemed to sense that they only wanted to help and it grew calmer and slowed down. Then one of its companions swam underneath and nudged its head to the surface, assisting the creature to breathe. As the whale broke the surface and exhaled through its blowhole, it threw up a fine. cool mist.

The weakened whale had no reaction as the divers lined up for the final cut to save it. Eventually the rope parted and the net fell away. Minutes passed and still the whale did not respond. At last, with a gentle sweep of its tail, it slowly swam away. Picking up speed, It headed towards its companions. When it reached them, all four mammals began tailstapping the water, as if applauding the achievement of the rescue team. Watching from a 45 distance, the rescue team felt an overwhelming sense of satisfaction. Then, turning together, the whales swam south towards Antarctica. Adapted from To Free a Giant by John Parish
