During the March holidays, Mahesh amped up his training routine by climbing the stairs in doubles. I was tasked with timing him at the peak – the twenty-fifth floor landing. Although I hated to admit it, his stamina was increasing. There were some days when he arrived at the top barely breathless, although his face was always red and his shirt soaked with sweat.




