Have you ever seen a three-metre tall man prancing about on the road? Mr Soh is one such man. In real life, he is only half that height but on festive occasions, he mounts his 1.5-metre stilts and doubles his height.

Mr Soh is one of the few remaining stilt-walkers in Singapore. Stilt-walking is not his full-time job. During the day, he works as a salesman. Mr Soh practises stilt-walking only at night on weekdays and in the weekends. He practises with his dance troupe. He does this more as a pastime – for fun and enjoyment.

Stilt-walking is not as easy as some people seem to think. In the past, a stilt-walker simply-walked on stilts and clowned about. Today, in order to keep the crowd's attention, Mr Soh has to perform some daring acrobatic acts such as somersaulting over a table or jumping through a ring of fire. Mr Soh works hard to improve his skills. "Acrobatics is difficult to learn but beautiful to watch when it's performed gracefully," said Mr Soh.

According to Mr Soh, not all stilt-walkers perform acrobatics. Some of them dress up as women to play female roles. They must be good at impersonating ancient Chinese maidens in the way they walk, talk and behave. More male stilt-walkers, like Mr Soh, have become very skilful at this.

Mr Soh usually performs on festive occasions like the Chingay procession, at religious ceremonies and at funerals. The Chinese believe that stilt-walking provides entertainment for the gods during these occasions.
