Plastic Seas and Oceans

According to the National Geographic Sociey, single-use plastics have found their way into our water sources at an astonishing rate every year. Marine animals mistake plastic for food, while others can become entangled in the trash. Even the ubiquitous drinking straw has become a growing threat because they are seldom recycled due to their small and lightweight nature. Several organisations around the world have come together to say "No" to straws!

What Can We Do?

- Reduce: To eliminate some of the excess packaging ending up in landfills and the waters, encourage your family to shop for snacks, cereal and pasta in bulk.
 Then, store them all in reusable glass jars.
- Reuse: Bring your own reusable bags instead of plastic bags provided by stores.
 Instead of packing your sandwich and snacks in plastic bags, use reusable containers.
- Recycle: Think about how often you use plastic water bottles, and see if you can
 make a change. Instead of going out with the trash, plastic bottles can be turned
 into items like flower pots or pieces of decorative art.


