Furry Friends Animal Shelter Open House 15 May 2018 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.





There were very few milk deliverie to residences on Saturdays. My father would finish his deliveries early and swing by the house in his milk truck for Bobby and me so we could "surf the truck". The empty metal milk crates were by then stacked and roped off expertly against the side panels to prevent them from sliding. This left most of the back empty, and Bobby and I would stand in the space created our feet planted firmly on the ribbed floor, and our arms out at our sides in an attempt to remain upright as the truck rattled along the streets

I always surfed in the forward position which was an advantage because I could see the turns coming. Bobby surfed more or less blindly behind me. Of course our injuries were not serious — a jammed finger, a skinned knee, and most Saturdays we surfed until I cried Somehow, Bobby, when he was injured, refused to cry. I deeply envied Bobby's self-control and tried my best to emulate him so our fun could go on longer. Every Saturday, I would tell myself that I was not going to cry. However, when I went crashing into the side of the truck, and my fathe, upon hearing the impact, turned around in his seat to check on me, my resolution would dissolve.

Each week, I told myself I would be braver, that this Saturday, I would not reach out and hold on for safety. But every outing was the same as the last and when the moment came, I grabbed on for safety. I hated the fact that Bobby never did, Neither did he cry. Gradually, I began wishing for something else entirely. I never wanted Bobby to be seriously injured, of course. But I did wish that just once he would be hurt bad enough to cry.
