



20 May 2018 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.



Traditionally, it was obtained from the stomach of calves. At the end of the curdling stage, the cheese is a very soft moist mass. If the cheese made is a soft cheese, then it is drained, salted and packaged. The production of hard (36)cheeses is more complex. It involves the curd being cut up small cubes to aid drainage, then heated to drive out more whey. At the end, the curds are compressed into a single mass. Aging is the final stage in cheese making where the cheese is left controlled environment for a few days to a few years. Salt is added at this stage to add flavor and to act as a preservative so the cheese does not spoil during long months of aging.

In the darkness, Taki rowed us out from the beach into deeper water, humming quietly to himself. Inside the boat lay a pole two metres long, armed with three fierce-looking prongs at the end. He shifted the trident only slightly in his grasp but the movement was ill-advised. Suddenly, in self-defence, the octopus turned from a drab, sandy colour to a bright and startling green. It squirted out a jet of water and, propelled by this, it shot off the sea bed in a swirl of sand. With its tentacles trailing behind it as it sped through the water, it looked just like a runaway balloon.

Taki threw the trident down in the bottom of the boat and seizing the oars, rowed swiftly in the wake of the octopus which came to rest on the sea bed some twelve metres away.
