



Greeting us with a smile and a hearty handshake, he walked into the room in the Singapore Sports Hub. From the start, we could feel the enthusiasm and sense of warmth in this man with an unfalling smile on his face and an impish twinkle in his eyes. Rahim Resad, previously a school sports trainer who became a semi-professional cyclist, had ridden his bicycle in many places.

He was in the midst of packing his bags for his year-long two-wheeler trip from Norway to Singapore when we caught up with him. Just before his departure, we interviewed him. As he shared his experiences with us, we questioned ourselves whether we had as much resilience as he does.

"How and when did you first take cycling seriously?" I ventured to ask.

He explained that that was in 2008 after his doctor's advice to shed some weight as his health had been deteriorating. "I was overweight and diagnosed with arterial disease, to name but two of many problems. Of course I was panicky. I brought my old rusty bike out for a spin, and couldn't go for more than 5km without struggling to breathe. I realised how serious it was. I went home to draft a fitness plan and executed that for a straight three months."

When asked if his childhood experiences had played a part in developing his passion in adventure and cycling, the response was excited, "I grew up cycling practically everywhere. A group of us children had our mini-cycling adventures. We explored places on our bikes and went to places in the neighbourhood. Once, my friends and I found an old sword on a trail without expecting it! We didn't know what to do with it at first. But we passed it to a police post. When I began cycling again in 2008, those old memories returned to me. The dream to go far and see the world on a bike came into my mind. Although my fitness was not up to the mark, I put my mind to it and trained hard to make the dream come true."

He drank the water from his bottle, and told us about his cycling adventure to the interior of Borneo. "My Borneo trip started from Kota Kinabalu in Sabah, to Brunei, Miri in Sarawak, all the way to Kuching, before continuing in Lundu. That was the end of Sarawak and I crossed over the border into Kalimantan. From there, I rode to the east of Kalimantan and took a boat into Tarakan. Then, I exited Kalimantan and went to Tawau, in Sabah. I rode for ten days to arrive at where I had started, Kota Kinabalu. It took that long to make just one round, cycling on the third largest island in the world, Borneo!"


"I learned about the locals in Borneo. What I learned was contradictory to what some others had told me before about the people, that they were dangerous. I remember one incident in Kalimantan. I was riding from Martapura to Tanjung, a distance of 200 kilometres. Towards the midpoint of the Journey, a truck came out from a mining site. The truck driver gave a friendly 'honk' and it went on its way. Five minutes later, when the sky was getting darker, I saw the same truck on the side of the road with the driver holding a plastic bag, waving at me to stop. I was exhausted from the blistering heat. He handed me a bag of fried chicken. It was the best chicken I had throughout my entire stay in Borneo. We chatted for ten more minutes before he drove to the oil palm plantation. I met other strangers who offered me accommodation and guided me to my next stop. There are many other similar stories I can share. Another type or experience was in the forests of Borneo. I had perspired a lot. There was no clean water in the area and I was alone. I went without bathing during that whole period which lasted five days. I resorted to drying my only jersey in the sun and wearing it back again every day during that period in the forests. I felt cleaner that way!"
