Singapore has been shrouded in haze for the past week. However, Indonesia is unlikely to be the (16) source of the haze.

"The hazy conditions are probably the result of local pollution instead of forest fires in Indonesia or the region. Based on satellite images, there are no (17) significant hot spots identified in the nearby countries. The haziness is due to the (18) accumulation of pollutants which cannot be dispersed," said Mr Sim, the spokesman for the National Environment Agency (NEA). In July 2016, the Michelin Guide was launched in Singapore-and Mr Chan's chicken rice stall in Chinatown Food Centre was the first hawker stall to receive a Michelin Star. His \$2 chicken rice became the cheapest Michelin meal in the world. Overnight, he became a celebrity.

Two years after Mr Chan Hon Meng received a Michelin star for his soya sauce chicken, life for the hawker had changed and yet it had not. Mr Chan no longer woke up at 4 a.m. to toil at his cramped Chinatown hawker stall, preparing ingredients, cooking and cleaning the stall single-handedly. Nor did he have to worry about having money to pay his suppliers on time. After he had received the award, he went to two restaurants by noon to oversee the staff and train them to do their jobs well. He also had to ensure food quality.

-However, some things never changed. He still took public transport to work from his three-room flat in Chinatown He also changed into his white chef's uniform at the stall without fail.

Mr Chan was the eldest of five children. All of them helped out at their parents' farm in Malaysia. Mr Chan had volunteered to prepare meals for his family and gradually developed an interest in cooking. Subsequently, he wished to start his own restaurant someday.

When he was eighteen, Mr Chan left his hometown to look for work in Singapore, Fuelled by his dream, he immediately applied to work in a Chinese restaurant to pick up culinary skills. For the next fifteen years, he worked as a kitchen helper in several Chinese restaurants. He had learnt to cook soya sauce chicken and adapted the recipe to his taste.

With some savings, Mr Chan then started a hawker stall in Chinatown. His life changed when a Channel 8 television crew member exploring the sprawling Chinatown hawker centre stumbled on his stall. Mr Chan explained that the crew member was attracted to it because he had hung many chickens at his stall, Most stalls usually hung only two or three chickens. The man ate his chicken rice and liked it. He asked Mr Chan if he would like to be on a television programme which turned out to be the Michelin testing by seven judges. Five of them rated Mr Chan one star and he was declared a success.

Three months later, he signed a deal with Hersing Culinary to expand his chicken rice business to include two restaurants. All three outlets came under the brand name 'Hawker Chan Chicken Rice'. He chose to partner Hersing Culinary as it offered to take his food to other countries in the region. Most importantly, it was because the company was not driven purely by profits. Initially, Hersing Culinary had wanted to reprice his chicken rice to \$10 a plate. riding on its Michelin fame. However, Mr Chan was adamant about selling cheap and good food to cater for the ordinary folk. The company relented and allowed Mr Chan to continue selling chicken rice at \$2 at the Chinatown hawker stall and charge affordable prices at the restaurants.

True to its word, Hersing Culinary had taken Mr Chan's chicken rice overseas. There were three outlets in Taipei, two in Bangkok and one in Melbourne. Mr Chan's main involvement was quality control. He also had the final say in the new dishes created in these restaurants.

Mr Chan marvelled at how his life had evolved since his humble days as a kitchen helper, and counted his **blessings**. "There are people who can cook better than me but are not recognised for their skills," he said quietly. "I'm just lucky."
