Leonardo da Vinci was a painter, architect, inventor, and student of all things scientific. His natural genius crossed so many disciplines that he (16) epitomised the term "Renaissance man." Today, he is best known for his art.

Two of his paintings, Mona Lisa and The Last Supper, remain among the world's most famous and enduring works of all time. Art, Leonardo believed, (17) was indisputably connected with science and nature. Drawn in 1490, art and (18) science intersected perfectly in Leonardo's sketch of "Vitruvian Man".

Largely self-educated, he filled dozens of secret notebooks with inventions, observations and theories about his <u>pursuits</u> from aeronautics to (19) anatomy. However, the ideas he expressed in his notebooks were often difficult to interpret. As a result, though he was <u>lauded</u> in his time as a great (20) artist, his peers often did not fully appreciate his genius.

Highlights:


- · trails for hiking and mountain biking
