



Scientists have come up with proof of the power of positive thinking. They have found that people who have an optimistic <u>outlook</u> on growing older live longer than those (16) who are constantly worrying. The research suggests that people who feel bad about getting old <u>accelerate</u> the ageing process. In contrast, a positive attitude will add more (17) years to your life than not smoking or taking regular exercise.

The researchers, led by Dr Becca Levy, from Yale University, said the effect of a positive attitude towards ageing was greater than physiological measures such as low blood pressure and cholesterol. The effect was even more pronounced than factors such (18) as keeping weight down and not smoking. Dr Levy's team believe the sheer will to live (19) partly explains the link between positive thinking and longevity. In general, negative self-perceptions can diminish life expectancy. Optimism is thus the key to longevity.
