



I managed to find the street the theatre was on but when I turned the comer, I stopped in shock. The street in front of the theatre was chock full of bikers — lots and lots of very big, tough-looking bikers.

Now, I was a woman all alone in a strange neighbourhood at night. There in front of me were twenty or so very large men, all wearing insignia that denoted they were in some sort of club or gang. Like most women in that situation, warning bells began to sound and my heart jumped in my throat. Then, horrified thoughts invaded my mind. Was I at the right theatre? Had I misread the date of the animal shelter event? Had I inadvertently wandered into a bad neighbourhood after all?

Just then, a notice outside the theatre caught my eye. A glance at it assured me that I was in the right place on the right evening. I wondered if I should hasten back to my hotel instead of walking through that crowd of bikers. I finally decided that I would be safer inside the theatre where there was, presumably, a crowd of people.

I scurried into the theatre, which turned out to contain even more bikers than the street outside. What was going on? I paid for a ticket and moved inside where I anxiously took a seat, chiding myself over and over again for going on this little adventure in the first place.

As I sat there, heart racing, waiting for the film to start, I muttered a prayer to put my anxieties out of my mind. A local blues-rock band-was the opening act and within a few minutes, their performance drew my attention. They were really good. In fact, I later went online and bought all of their albums. Enthusiasm for the band's performance soon took away all of the worries from my mind and I began to relax and have a good time.

After the band was done, the emcee took the stage and introduced us to the tiny Chihuahua that he had adopted through the effort detailed in the documentary. Then the film began to play and I understood the presence of the bikers after a conversation with the emcee. They had been part of the caravan that escorted the animals from New Jersey to Philadelphia two days ago. They were all part of an animal rescue group. At that moment, I was struck by the bonds that had drawn so many disparate folks to the theatre that night. We had been brought together by our shared love of animals. I made new friends, discovered a new band I love and supported an important cause. I stayed till the very end and made it to my hotel without any incident. Something gave me courage to venture into the unknown and the result was one of the best nights of my life.
