



I was with a filming crew in Argentina on an expedition to capture large colonies of fur seals in action. However, by noon, I thought that I had taken a wrong turn. When I saw a small farm up ahead, I immediately approached it. Three farmers with wide smiles came out to greet us because visitors were a rare sight. They were fascinated that we had travelled so far from England just to film fur seals. Although the locals must have thought we were insane, they were too well-mannered to say so. In fact after giving us some directions, they helped us on the subject of fur seals too.

The farmers explained that the female seals by this time would have had their pups. This meant that the colonies were no longer easily found at one spot on the beach. Instead, they drifted frequently along the coast, depending on their moods. Thus, the farmers helped us mark areas on the map to show us where the biggest concentration of seals lived.

We found the seals by the evening. A short walk through tall grass led us to the edge of a cliff. There on the beach below us, by the edge of the waves, lay the fur seal colony. From where we stood, the animals greeted us like a thunderous cauldron of boiling porridge. The colony of about seven hundred animals lay spread out along the beach. As they moved in the sunlight, they gleamed like a swarm of golden bees. I was mesmerised by this sight. I forgot about filming. Instead, I squatted and stared.

In our following observations, we paid greater attention to the seal pups of the colony. These lively little ones playfully moved with the mass of adult seals. I took a particular interest in a pup that had obviously been born later than the others. Oswald, as I named him, was half the size of other pups. Yet, what Oswald lacked in bulk, he more than made up for in his determination.

We had previously seen the swimming lessons carried out by the father seals and we found it stressful. I especially felt quite sorry for Oswald His father paused at the edge of the water, held Oswald with his teeth by the back of his neck. The father shook Oswald to and fro so vigorously, until one would think that the pup's neck was broken. Then, he hurled Oswald further out into the deep waters. After a while, Oswald eventually surfaced, spluttering and flapping his flippers desperately before attempting to swim back towards the shore. However, his father lumbered into the water, caught him before holding him under the water for another ten seconds and eventually releasing him. When Oswald popped up, he was gasping for breath.

This happened a few times before a frightened and exhausted Oswald protested by crying out at his father like a small dog trying to attack an elephant. However, his stem father simply picked him up and flung him out again. This whole process repeated itself. Eventually, when it was obvious that Oswald was too tired to swim, his father took him into the shallow waters for a rest. He was inflexible and ensured that Oswald did not escape. After Oswald had rested, his father was persistent. He picked the pup up and threw him out to sea again. This would have carried on if another male seal had not picked a quarrel with Oswald's father. While the adults were fighting, I unclenched my hands as I spotted Oswald scrambling back to shore. He looked utterly wet and emotionally-defeated.

These swimming lessons were an agony for us. Not only was the terror of the pups so pitiful but I was also convinced that the fathers might accidentally drown them. Surprisingly, the seal pups had the willpower to survive these swimming lessons, and none of them seemed to give up. We often forget that one's capacity for overcoming difficulty is stronger than what one would believe at first glance. In fact, it was indeed a lesson for me, one that I would vividly remember.
