

When he was young, Mr Fariz just wanted to fit in like other children. One day, while he was in his school library shelving books as a student librarian on duty, he realised that he was not where he wanted to be. He looked longingly at the basketball court. He enjoyed watching his friends in the school basketball team go through their drills. Deep in his heart, he wished that he was part of the team.

It was not that he did not try to get on the team. It was because he was always told that he was not good enough. In secondary school, the same situation arose. He was again told that he was better off joining the school band. He accepted his fate, but continued fuelling his passion for basketball by reading up on basketball techniques, watching the National Basketball Association (NBA) highlights on television, and playing recreationally. Eventually, Mr Fariz became a Physical Education (PE) teacher at Summit Primary School.

Mr Fariz reminisced, "My first four years there were great – the children I taught were appreciative, and I was satisfied. It was a wonderful place with great colleagues. I never felt the urge to change anything, but I was wrong."

A casual conversation with one of his students, Adam, left a deep impact on him. Adam really loved running and was keen to join the athletics team. He told Mr Fariz that he would go to the stadium every Saturday to train with his father so that he could have a shot at being selected for the school team. When he was turned down, Adam felt that he would never be good enough. When asked if he was still running with his father, he said that he had stopped training altogether. That reminded Mr Fariz of his primary school days and he was committed to help Adam. He believed that students like Adam should never be denied an opportunity to participate in a sport they were passionate about. With the support of the principal and his colleagues, Mr Fariz was determined to change the situation and he came up with his grand plan.

First, he created the Sports Co-Curricular Activity (CCA) programme for all. CCAs were no longer just for the top athletes in the school. Mr Fariz strongly believed that a sport should be driven by passion, not just ability. Even though school teams needed to prepare for competitions, other students who are not in the school team should be allowed to participate and enjoy the activities too. Once the Track and Field

CCA was offered to all who were interested, its membership grew from 40 to 100.

Sports Day was the second item on his agenda. It was an annual tradition of the school. In previous years, a maximum of 240 competitors, including the best athletes from each level, competed while the remaining 720 students watched and cheered. With the same goal in mind, Mr Fariz conceptualised the Track and Field Camival. Each cohort took to the tracks one at a time, so everyone could experience competing in running, jumping and throwing events.

Fuelled by a strong belief that sports is not just about competition but also about having fun, Mr Fariz introduced the Endurance Run. This activity provided all students with the chance to run outdoors and challenge themselves to achieve their personal targets. Finally, Mr Fariz implemented the CCA Journal. Students recorded their experiences in their respective CCAs in their journals. Mr Fariz explained that through journaling, students are provided the opportunity to reflect on their achievements and the challenges they face, and how they can overcome them. 45 According to Mr Fariz, "I am determined to continue creating opportunities for my students to pursue their passion.
