Also, the blood sugar levels can sometimes drop drastically in people with diabetes. He/she might have a lot of different symptoms, including getting a headache and feeling drowsy or weak. These may lead to dire consequences if left untreated.



Health Ministry Recommendations

Do you know that 1 in 10 Singaporeans is diabetic and having too many desserts and sugared drinks can lead to obesity and diabetes? Here are some steps the Health Ministry recommends that one can take to reduce these health issues of obesity and diabetes.

- 1. Make healthy drinking your personal priority. Start by choosing beverages with few or no calories or take carbonated beverages in small quantities. However, plain water is still the best beverage.
- 2. Do not stock sugary drinks at home. Research shows that children and teens drink a lot of sweetened drinks at home so parents can help them cut back on their sugar intake by not stocking up on soda, fruit punch, or other sugary drinks in the house. Make them an occasional treat rather than a daily beverage.
- 3. Replace desserts with wholesome nuts. Nuts make delicious snacks and are high in vitamins and minerals! However, go for plain instead of candied ones!
