Twenty-six years ago. Yossi went deep into the Amazon jungle and got lost for three weeks. As a result, he lost a lot of weight as hunger, infection and disease took a toll on him. However, he miraculously survived the ordeal and wrote a book about his traumatic encounter years later. The question remains - how did he survive?

Yossi and Kevin continued on the raft and focused on being able to steer it - until Karl's words became their worst nightmare. Approaching a waterfall, they lost control of their raft and were thrown apart. Kevin made it to the shore but Yossi was thrown 20 overboard, floating away downstream. Yossi then spent four days trying to get back upriver to find his friend but to no avail. During this time, Kevin was rescued by some fishermen. He quickly went to the town and sought help from the local authorities. To his horror, he discovered that Karl was a criminal on the run. Kevin's heart sank upon hearing it.

Deep in the forest, Yossi scrambled around, lost and alone, without supplies or equipment in an unknown territory. He barely escaped beasts of prey and almost drowned in a flash flood. As the days passed, not only did Yossi run out of food, but he also realised his foot was starting to rot away from fungal infection. That was far worse than when giant red ants had walked all over and bit his body. He hunted for food but it 30 was insufficient. Yossi wanted to throw in the towel many times but believed he would be rescued one day. That day, as he was cleaning a fresh wound on his foot. Yossi heard the sound of an engine. Trying to find the source of the noise, he struggled to the riverbank. His 35 putse raced as he caught sight of Kevin. He was in a cance with some forest rangers who had arranged this search and rescue mission.

Yossi wanted to shout out but was too exhausted to do so. He panicked when he saw the party turning around and away from him. Summoning the little strength he had, Yossi lunged forward and fell into the water with a resounding splash. That caught 40 Kevin's attention and Yossi was finally rescued.

It took Yossi three months to recover from his injuries and trauma. He learnt that Karl and Marcus had disappeared into the forest. He could not believe that what had started as an exciting adventure had become a horror story for them. Knowing the terror of being lost in the jungle, Yossi strived to find them but days turned into weeks and weeks into 45 months. Death was a certainty. True enough, they were never found or heard of again.
