I was living in a wooden cottage at the edge of the beach in Hawaii, sixty metres away from the school that I taught in.

During a break in lessons that day, I had gone back to the cottage to pick up a book I had forgotten. With the book in my hands, I closed the door. A group of five children ran up to me, smiles on their faces, the faces that would now haunt me forever.

"Miss! Miss!" they called. "Come and see! Come and see!" I followed them to see an amazing sight. The ocean was retreating fast and silently. The bottom of it was exposed, revealing rocks and sand I had not known of before. It was as if the ocean was taking a huge mouthful of its own water. I turned to look at the excited youngsters who had not seen such a sight before. "Big Wave Coming!" the children exclaimed. As soon as they said that, we saw a mass of water gathering on 10 the horizon, like one big wave.

I stood there, still not understanding what was happening as the children played merrily in the water. Then the children and I all saw it instantaneously. The water near us was drawn out much faster than the earlier time. At the same time, a huge wall of water appeared behind the lighthouse at the end of the ocean. I was so frightened, I stood paralysed looking at that massive amount of water which seemed to get higher by the second as it approached.

I immediately grabbed the children near me and wanted to dash to the hill beside the beach to escape the waters. However, I wondered whether we would be able to reach the hill in time - it was a good hundred metres away. I decided against it and ran with the children back to the cottage instead. As we entered the cottage, the air was filled with the loudest roaring wind I had ever heard. Without warning, the wave hit the cottage. It all seemed to happen so quickly that my memory was a blur.

The crash of glass signalled the waters breaking in. I clung to the door frame. I saw the children all holding onto something, whatever was closest. Soon, the cottage buckled under the pressure and was swept away by the huge waves. I surfaced from the water to see the roof close 25 by. Some of the children, like myself, managed to clamber onto it.

We were whisked out to sea at great speed by the waves. As I caught my breath, I realised that the sea had ripped apart everything. Around me, I could see other teachers and students likewise clinging to objects. This next wave, which caught us by surprise, knocked us all off the objects we were holding onto. I was submerged in the water.

Instinctively, I held my breath. After a while, my lungs could hold out no longer. I gave up all hope of survival. I took a breath — and it was air I breathed. Like some miracle, I found myself on top of the water. I gulped the air ravenously as if it was years since I had last breathed.

I started to swim as best I could. I reached the calmer waters beyond the rocks and was surprised to find myself floating, only to realise that I was now clinging to some debris, a red board 35 I recognised as having been hanging in my classroom. Raising my body out of the water, I called for help. Seeing the shore a long way off, I knew that no one would hear me.

With that thought, my hearing picked up a buzzing sound in the air. I looked up to see a small plane flying low. I waved like I had never waved before in all my life as I knew it was my only chance of survival. A bundle fell into the sea nearby. I swam over to the yellow package. The rubber life raft inflated like a dream. I used my last energy to hoist myself over the side. I lay there, still, relieved.
