Rubber is a natural substance obtained from rubber trees. The tree takes about six years to reach maturity. Rubber was used by many (16) age-old cultures to make balls, containers and even textiles. In 1493, Italian explorer Christopher Columbus observed the (17) Indigenous boys in Haiti playing with a bouncy rubber ball. It was very different from the stiff leather balls that were (18) prevalent in Europe at that time. However, there was no real interest in rubber yet, and it took many more years before it became a commonly used material.

Rubber is harvested from rubber trees in the form of a white substance called latex which (19) through a small opening flows slowly out when a cut is made to the bark. The slanted cut on the bark has to be (20) precise – too shallow and the liquid will not flow, too deep and the tree will die. The cuts on the tree heal over time and the same area can be tapped again. After making the cut, a container is attached to collect the latex.
