Another myth is about Medusa. She was a ravishingly beautiful maiden.

However, she <u>antagonised</u> the goddess Athena. Greatly angered, Athena turned (18)

Medusa's lovely tresses into serpents. Her looks were so <u>grotesque</u> that one gaze at (19)

her face would turn onlookers to stone. To <u>get around</u> that, Perseus, a brave warrior, (20) looked at her reflection in his mirrored shield and beheaded her while she was

sleeping. Then, he quickly took flight on his winged sandals.

These myths have inspired many artists and details of the ancient tales have been found on everything from pottery to temples to stone statues.

Prize presentation will be held on the spot after judging.


