Edson Arantes Do Nascimento (better known as Pelé) was discovered at eleven by one of the country's (21)premier players, who declared then, "This boy will be the greatest soccer player in the world." He was right! Pelé's (22)influence in soccer proved to be legendary. At the 1958 World Cup in Sweden, seventeen year-old Pelé proved to be a (23)dominating force on the field, and helped Brazil win its first World Cup over Sweden. Pelé had great balance, which enabled him to dribble effortlessly around defenders and leaving them (24)upset on the pitch. His heading ability was also remarkable. Pelé holds the world record for scoring 97 goals on the international level. In contrast, today's top players can barely score more than 30 goals in a season. Pelé retired from the game in the 1970s. In addition to his great accomplishments in soccer, he published several best-selling (25)accounts of his life which he wrote, starred in several documentary and semi-documentary films, and composed numerous musical pieces.

Neptune, known as Poseidon to the Ancient Greeks, was the most important god of the seas and water in Roman mythology. Neptune was the brother of Jupiter (known as Zeus to the Greeks) and Pluto (Hades). After the defeat of their father, Saturn, the three brothers divided the world into three parts to be ruled by each of them: Jupiter took the sky, Neptune the seas and water and Pluto the underworld.

At the Neptune festival each July to honour Neptune, Roman citizens would picnic outdoors, feasting and drinking wine. Neptune had a reputation for having a violent temper. The Romans believed that violent storms were a reflection of his furious rage. However, he could also prevent these *disasters* to protect the sailors. Such was his power over the seas and the sailors who sailed *them*.

The Romans were seafaring people who imported many goods by ship so a sea god was important in their daily lives to ensure their safety. In those days, the ships were small and tended to capsize more easily. They also lacked modern-day navigation system and equipment found in ships today. At times, the sailors also had to fight for their lives against vicious pirates who tried to rob them of their goods.

Neptune married a water nymph, Amphitrite, and had a child called Triton who was half man and half fish. Artists often depicted Neptune as a bearded man carrying a three-pronged spear - a trident. It is a hunting weapon popular with Mediterranean fishermen. He would be sitting in a seashell drawn by seahorses, accompanied by dolphins. In some paintings, apart from the trident, he is shown carrying a whip, to remind the people that he is also the god of horses. Many fountains in Europe have a statue of Neptune. The most famous of them all would have to be a twenty-foot high marble statute at the Trevi Fountain which was completed in 1761. Today, the Trevi Fountain remains a popular tourist attraction in Rome.

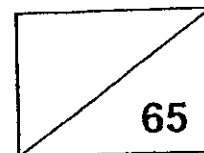
