

I decided to set up camp near the \*ravine since fresh water was readily available and there was an abundance of firewood. The ravine was so deep that there was very little sunlight. Therefore, for most of the day, it remained in shadow. This encouraged many birds and animals to emerge from their hiding places during the hours of daylight. Few people ever passed that way. As a result, the ravine had become a little haven for wildlife, one of the few natural sanctuaries left near Mussoorie in Northern India.

Nearly every morning, I leisurely walked down the path from my campsite to the stream. I could hear the cry of the deer and witness families of birds gliding down the ravine on gigantic, motionless wings. As I had not come to take anything from the jungle, the birds and the animals grew accustomed to me. One evening, as I was strolling, I heard them chattering in the trees and behind the tall bushes. As I crossed the stream and began climbing a hill, the grunting and chattering amplified as if they were trying to warn me of some hidden danger. The next minute, a shower of pebbles came rattling down the steep hillside and I looked up to see an orange-gold leopard poised on a rock six metres above me.

It was not looking towards me but had its head thrust attentively forward in the direction of the ravine. It must have sensed my presence because it slowly turned its head to look down at me. It seemed a little puzzled by my presence. To give myself courage, I sang my favourite song loudly and the leopard sprang away into the bushes, making no sound as it melted into the shadows. The leopard, like other members of the cat family, was nearing extinction in India and I was surprised to find one so close to Mussoorie. I had disturbed the animal in its quest for food. A little later, I heard the cry of a deer

as it fled through the forest; it was still on. Probably deforestation had driven the deer into this green valley and the leopard naturally had followed.

Although it was some weeks before I saw the leopard again, I was often made aware of its presence. A low, deep growl often gave it away. At times, I felt almost certain that I was being followed. One evening, I found the remains of the deer which had been partially eaten. They were quite a sight. I wondered why the leopard had not hidden the remains of his meal and drew a conclusion – it must have been disturbed while eating. Climbing the hill, I met a party of *shikaris* who were fully armed with guns. This group of hunters asked me if I had seen a leopard. I shrugged. Leopard-skins, they told me were selling at over a thousand rupees each! There was a ban on the export of skins but they led me to understand that there were means to sell it and ways to conceal the evidence. "It's quite easy to make a profit as long as one knows how to cover one's tracks and not get caught," they proclaimed proudly.

I thanked them for the information and walked on. I shook my head, unable to accept what I had heard.
