As a boy growing up in Shenyang, China, Lang Lang practised the piano six hours a day. His mother taught him how to read notes and his father, Mr Lang, concertmaster of a local orchestra, showed him how to control the keys. At first, he played on clunky Chinese keyboards – cheap, but the best they could afford. Later, his parents bought him a Swedish piano, but he broke it while playing Tchaikovsky. That was when his parents decided **he was too much for such an instrument – and for their hometown.** To be a serious musician, he would have to move to Beijing. 5

Mr Lang knew that life would not be easy being a pianist. "You need fortune. If you don't work, no fortune comes," Mr Lang said. To relocate to Beijing with Lang Lang, Mr Lang made a great sacrifice. He left his job, which he loved, and Mrs Lang stayed behind in Shenyang to keep working at her job to support Lang Lang. Both father and son stayed in an unheated building with five families sharing one bathroom. He would take Lang Lang on his bicycle to school as the bus fare was too expensive. During the coldest nights, while Lang Lang practised on the piano, Mr Lang wouldn't lie in Lang Lang's bed so it would be warm when he slept on it. 10 15

Lang Lang's teacher from Beijing did not like him. She felt that he did not have any talent and soon 'fired' him. He was devastated. He did not want to be a pianist anymore. One day, Lang Lang was asked to play some songs and that made him realise that he was talented after all. He approached his father the very day and told him that he wanted to study with a new teacher. From **that point on**, everything turned around. 20

Having very little to spend, Mr Lang had to borrow money to pay for a trip to Germany to enter Lang Lang in a contest in which Lang Lang came in first. Mr Lang gave Lang Lang a standing ovation as he celebrated his victory. To become a world-class musician, Lang Lang had to play on the world's biggest stages. The duo moved to Philadelphia where Lang Lang was **accepted as a student of the venerable Gary Graffman.** 25

Lang Lang continued practising and finally worked hard enough for fortune to take over. One day, he received an invitation to play at Chicago's Ravinia Festival. After the festival, music gigs started pouring in and the papers were buzzing with talk of a budding pianist. 30

There had been many concerts held in Carnegie Hall, but for Lang Lang, playing there was especially sweet as he recalled his journey there from Beijing. Together, both father and son worked to reach the lucky place where Lang Lang's fortune was spotted, allowing him to shine.

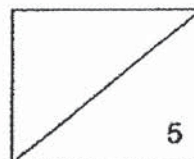

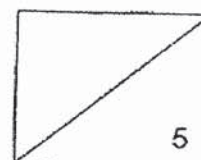
