

The Black Knights is the aerobatics team of the Republic of Singapore Air Force (RSAF) The official jet of the Black Knights is the F16-C Fighting Falcon. The Black Knights' emblem is sported on the red vertical tail of each of the team's aircraft. The team's name is printed on both sides of the aircraft and are painted in red and white – the national colours of Singapore.

The team was commissioned in 1973 initially as the Osprey Red, five years after the creation of the RSAF and eight years as an independent nation. In 1974, the team was renamed as the Black Knights.

Airshow Performance 2: Lockheed Martin F-35 Lightning II Daily Performance Time: 1400 Hrs



The F-35 Lightning II is a single-seat, single-engine fighter aircraft designed for many missions with advanced, integrated sensors built into every aircraft. The F-35 Lightning II is a 5th-generation fighter that combines advanced stealth capabilities with fighter speed and agility.


Missions that were traditionally performed by small numbers of specialized aircraft can now be executed by a squadron of F-35s, bringing new capabilities to many allied forces.

The AN-124 Ruslan, developed by Antonov, is the world's biggest military transport aircraft, thanks to its giant take-off weight of 392 tons. The AN-124 Ruslan can carry a load of 120 tons and is suitable for transporting heavy and oversized cargoes, as well as various combat vehicles.

The first flight of the AN-124 Ruslan was conducted in December 1982. The aircraft features a cargo compartment that is 20 percent larger than most planes. The special front and rear doors of the aircraft allows for rapid loading or off-loading of heavy cargoes with ease.

Do you know about the cable car incident that took place in Singapore?
On 29 January 1983, an accident when the lifting device of an oil rig
passed under the aerial ropeway and struck the cable that stretched over the waterway between the
Jardine Steps Station and the Sentosa Station. As a, two cabins plunged 55 (52)
metres into the sea, killing seven people. The oil rig was being towed from Keppel (53)
Wharf when it became entangled in the cable and it to snap. It also left thirteen (54)
people trapped in four cabins between Mount Faber and Sentosa. The disaster was the first involving
death or injury since the cable car system in February 1974. (55)
The Police Force, Civil Defence and the Singapore Armed Forces were involved in the all-night
rescue The overall operation was directed by the then Colonel Lee Hsien Loong. (56)
There were fears that the oil rig could drift further and cause damage. The problem (57)
was worsened by a combination of strong currents and the rising tide. To the rig (58)
