Amelia was a pioneer in the sky in the 1900s. She developed a fascination with (16) flying at a young age. At the age of 23, Amelia took her first plane ride. Within seconds, she was hooked and quickly enrolled in flying lessons. Two years later, she received her pilot's licence and purchased her own plane.

The more Amelia flew, the more daring she became. She clocked 500 hours of solo flying time, a <u>feat</u> for someone in the early decades of the 20th century. In 1932, the "Queen of the Air" <u>undertook</u> her most daring journey yet. She departed from Canada and landed (18)

15 hours later in Ireland. Her <u>reputation</u> as the world's greatest female pilot was sealed.

Five years later, Amelia set out on a new and greater challenge. The 47000-kilometre journey around the globe would be <u>arduous</u>. However, with only 11 000 kilometres (20) to go, she never made it. It is unclear whether Amelia was lost, had crashed or run out of fuel.

Search efforts continued for 17 days but they could not find any trace of Amelia or her plane. The great pioneer was lost in a great mystery.
