. It is still early morning in Rajasthan, India and the time is just after half past five. The thermometer, however, has already climbed above 30 degrees centigrade and another scorching day beckons. It is therefore quite understandable that teachers at Vidyalaya, a local school in the district, and their 150 pupils should start the day at seven and finish at twelve. After that, the heat | 5 is simply unbearable.

For 28 children from the Vidyalaya school, today marks the start of an exciting week. While their fathers start their work in the fields and their mothers collect their daily water supplies from the village well, the children find out what they can expect over the course of the next five days - the Swarovski Water Conservation Centre has finally arrived in the sleepy Indian village. Five trainers will be giving lessons throughout the week.

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The five trainers, who will spend the next five days teaching the 28 children about how best to manage water resources, were recruited locally. They all come from the region and speak the same dialect that the children learn at 15 home from their parents. Showing great commitment, they will work closely with the inquisitive children over the next few days, giving lessons in the poorly equipped classrooms and visiting the nearby national park together. It is surprising to discover that only a handful of children have visited the park, which is famous around the world for its rich variety of reptiles and birds. It means they are all the more excited when they finally see with their own eyes the incredible species that live just a stone's throw away.

Each of the children carrying out experiments in the Keoladeo National Park is already well aware of the issues concerning water provision. During the summer months, in particular, if the monsoon arrives late or is not particularly 25 heavy, the whole region is at risk, because everyone and everything is dependent on water. There are two wells in the village, one of which, however, is already dry. In addition, the water that comes from the pump in the school yard has a very high salt content and is not suitable for drinking, while the local sewerage systems also leave a lot to be desired.

"The more precious water becomes, the more conscientiously people manage it," explains Dr Imboden, a renowned international expert in nature conservation. "We start with the children, who take their newfound knowledge home with them. Thus, we know that, step by step, we can achieve real success.
