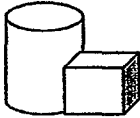

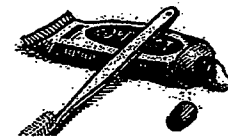

On the morning of Sunday, February 13, 2000, newspaper readers opened their comic pages as they had done for nearly fifty years to read the latest adventures of Charlie Brown and Snoopy. This Sunday was different. Mere hours before newspapers hit the doorsteps (31) _____ the final original *Peanuts* comic strip, its creator Charles M. <p>Just 60 years ago, when much of Asia still moved by foot or hoof, the Tea Horse Road was a thoroughfare of commerce and the main link between China and Tibet. The Chinese military's need for Tibetan horses and Tibet's appetite for Chinese tea created a trade network spanning the Tibetan Plateau. I had seen what was left of the original trail in China. To find the legendary Tea Horse Road in Tibet, I had to explore a way into these forbidden mountains. I called my wife, Sue, who was an experienced mountaineer, and asked her to meet me at the city of Nagqu. Along the way, we went to see the legendary horses that gave their name to the Tea Horse Road. The weeklong annual horse festival used to be held on the open plains but ten years ago, a concrete stadium was built so that Chinese officials would have some place to sit. When we arrived the next morning, Tibetans packed the stands to the brim while the hawkers sold spicy boiled potatoes and cans of Budweiser, an American beer. Blaring speakers announced each event in Tibetan and Chinese.</p>	5
<p>Down on the field, horse and rider seemed to defy gravity. A contestant galloped furiously, dangling like an acrobat off the side to pluck a white silk scarf from the ground. Clods of mud propelled into the sharp blue sky. Holding the scarf, the Tibetan cowboy bowed as the crowd roared. The Nagqu Horse Festival was one of the few surviving events celebrating Tibet's equestrian heritage. Through centuries of selective breeding, Tibetans created a premium horse. Standing at only 4.5 feet, it was fine-limbed and handsome-faced. It had enlarged lungs adapted to life on the 15,000-foot-high, oxygen-starved Tibetan Plateau. Tibetan steeds were bred to be sure-footed on snowy passes. These were the horses coveted by the Chinese centuries ago.</p>	10
<p>After that, Sue and I drove to a village that was situated between two enormous passes. Surreptitiously, we went door-to-door looking for horses to take us up to 17,756-foot Nubgang Pass. There was none to be found and we were directed to a saloon on the edge of town. Inside, Tibetan cowboys were drinking beer, shooting pool and placing bets on a dice game. They laughed when we asked for horses.</p>	15
<p>Outside the saloon, instead of steeds of muscle standing in the mud, there were steeds of steel - tough little Chinese motorcycles with red-and-blue Tibetan wool rugs covered the saddles and tassels dangled from the handlebars. For a price, two cowboys offered to take us to the base of the pass. We set off in the dark the next morning, backpacks strapped to the bicycles like saddlebags. The cowboys were as adept on motorcycles as their ancestors were on horseback. We bounced through black bogs* where the mud was two feet deep and splashed through blue braided streams.</p>	20
<p>Up the valley, we passed the tents of Tibetan nomads. We were struck by the sight in front of us. Parked in front of many of the yak hair tents were big Chinese trucks or luxury cars. Where did the nomads get the money to buy such vehicles? It was certainly not from the traditional yak meat-and-butter farming. To our delight, the ancient path was quite visible, like a rocky trail, winding up meadows speckled with black yaks. After two hours of hard uphill hiking, we paddled through two shimmering sapphire tarns. Beyond these lakes, all green disappeared and everything turned to stone and sky. Mules carrying bags of tea stopped crossing this pass over half a century ago as the demand for western beer increased. The Nubgang Pass had been abandoned. There was a silence that only absence could create.</p>	25
