If you have ever been to the Bishan MRT station, you might have walked past a middle-aged man playing a guitar and singing aloud. You might have told yourself, "Oh, he's just another street busker." It might come as a pleasant surprise to you to know that the street busker who can play and sing so well is actually blind!

Raymond Tay worked as a stenographer for fourteen years, taking notes in Braille before converting them into printed text. His job was mundane and the pay somewhat low. When word processing software and computers were introduced into the office, his work became more difficult as he could not tell what he had typed on the new machine. Frustrated, he quit.

Having picked up guitar-playing while he was in the School for the Blind and later the harmonica on his own, the musically-inclined Raymond decided to become a street busker. His wife was hesitant, but he was determined. To date, he has been busking for about seven years. "From the Asians' point of view busking is like begging. But I think that, so long as you produce a good piece of music, it justifies the collection," Raymond said. "Besides, you get to choose which songs you like to sing, and when you want to turn up for work," he added with a smile.

Left blinded at the age of thirteen after fire crackers he was playing with exploded in his face, Raymond can usually be seen at the Bishan MRT station. His voice is strong and vibrant and his favourite songs are nostalgic ones like : *Oh, Carol!* and *Rhythm of the Rain*, which were popular in the 60's and 70's.

When asked if there were any occupational hazards in his line of work, he said, " Oh, yes! People have tried to take advantage of my visual handicap." Recounting an incident, he said, " Someone tried to steal my money while I was singing, but members of the public caught him and later whacked him. I didn't know what happened until I heard the commotion."

Now he has 'fans-turned-friends' who help him keep a look-out. One of them happily pointed out that Raymond can sing in English, Chinese, Hokkien and even Malay.

Raymond has had passers-by dropping him notes to compliment him on his singing. Some who wanted to make friends, even leave him their telephone numbers. He is totally relaxed when busking because of the freedom it gives him.

So it looks like we will see Raymond at his favourite stake-out, singing with gusto, for a long time to come.
