Read the passage below and answer questions 26 to 30.

As the bus approached, Elizabeth Jennings, a young African American, was dismayed that it was not displaying a 'Coloured People Allowed' sign. She would have waited for the next bus but she was late for Sunday church. As soon as the bus stopped, she boldly stepped aboard. When the conductor ordered her off, she firmly refused. 5

Born and raised in New York City, Elizabeth taught at a school on weekdays; on Sundays, she played the organ at church and directed the choir. Her parents ran a boarding house. A tailor by trade, her father also spent many hours helping the needy, and fighting for the legal rights of his fellow African Americans who did not enjoy the same rights as white New Yorkers. African Americans, for example, could not vote and the best schools and best jobs were off-limits to them, as were most of the restaurants in the city. 10

Even the city's bus companies did not allow them to use their regular buses. People, like Elizabeth, had to wait for separate 'coloured' buses. Some African Americans protested this unfairness by refusing to use these buses. One popular minister even died after walking many miles on a hot day. Others boldly boarded, and were unceremoniously thrown off. 15

This continued until the day Elizabeth boarded one and refused to budge. "The conductor took hold of me," she wrote, "and I took hold of the window bar. He pulled me until he broke my grasp. Then he and the driver both seized my arms and dragged me so that my feet hung one way and my head the other. Finally, a police officer grabbed me and without listening to anything I had to say," she continued, "thrust me out like a dog." 20

Elizabeth was too sore to attend the protest meeting organised by her community the next day. Her words were read aloud during the meeting. **Outraged**, Elizabeth's friends and family decided she should take legal action. Her lawyer was Chester Arthur, a future president of America. A supporter of African American rights, Arthur was the perfect choice. He pointed out a new state law that required bus companies to carry all respectable persons, regardless of race. They were also responsible for the actions of their staff. So if a conductor mistreated or refused service to an African American, the bus company could and should be punished. 25 30

Elizabeth Jennings won her fight against injustice and is remembered as a champion for civil rights.

As I drove my Dehli Transport Corporation bus packed with passengers on the evening of October 29, I did not know that two bombs had just ripped through the crowded markets, killing sixty shoppers and injuring hundreds more. All I knew was that I had left my pregnant wife, Nigam, at home instead of taking her shopping as promised. As a contract driver, I rarely turned down assignments, needing the income to feed the five mouths at home. 5

"There's a bomb on the bus!" someone shouted from the back as I drove through the southern reaches of the ring road that encircles the Indian capital. A passenger had spotted a black bag under one of the seats apparently left by a man who had got off the bus a short while earlier. 10

I slammed on the brakes but immediately realised I had stopped in a crowded area. "If it is a bomb, we have got to get out of here," I cried. Some of the passengers pleaded to be let off, but time was not on my hands. I was torn between respecting the wishes of those on board and the need to avoid a greater disaster. 15

I sped to an isolated area off the main road and ordered the seventy passengers off the bus. I ran for the bag but heard an ominous ticking as I picked it up. Inside I saw red and yellow wires sticking out of a clock. *Oh God! Just like in the movies!* For a moment, I considered plucking out the wires and defusing the bomb like a hero, but prudence prevailed. At great risk to myself, I grabbed the bag and ran from the bus. 20

Hands trembling, I had barely placed the bag on the ground twenty metres from the bus when the bomb exploded. The ear-piercing blast knocked me to the ground and set my clothes on fire. Pain shot through my right hand and my eyes. I blacked out, my blood-soaked body lying on the roadside. 25

It was not the first time that my courage and quick-thinking had prevented a tragedy. When I was twelve, I had used a wooden stick to pull my uncle out of a waterlogged field into which an exposed electrical cable had fallen. 30

A passing police van rushed me to hospital. When I came to, I mumbled my home phone number to the nurse. "Tell my wife that I have only hurt my hand," I whispered. I blacked out again and woke up three days later. The condition I saw myself in made me worry about my ability to continue to make a livelihood. 35

Doctors could not restore the vision in my right eye or the hearing in my right ear. I also lost one finger on my right hand.

Following the accident, measures were introduced to the local land transport safety regulations which included the need for every bus transport company to engage a full-time vehicle inspector. I heaved a sigh of relief as the last rays of the setting sun fell on my face. 40
