



I gave a sheepish smile. Apart from Grace, I did not speak much to others because I was afraid they would laugh at my stuttering. One evening on my way home after a lesson, I saw Nathan loitering in the 25 neighbourhood. Immediately, I ran back to Miss Deena's house. Sitting down at her doorstep, I started to tear.

"What's wrong, Ling?" Miss Deena, who was about to go out, asked. I poured my heart out and let my tears flow freely. Miss Deena patted my shoulder, comforting me. Towards the end of our conversation, she pulled out a bookmark from her bag. Handing it 30 to me, she said, "Ling, don't be afraid to be different." I looked down at the star-shaped bookmark with "You're special!" splashed across it. Those words spoke to me. Feeling liberated, I left for home embracing my flaw.

Since that conversation, my attitude changed. Instead of waiting in fear for the teacher to call my name, I raised my hand when I knew the answer to the question.
