There are many varieties of goldfish, of which some can grow up to 16 inches long. If you are tight on space, a fancy goldfish is a better fit for you. Fancy goldfish have two tails and a shorter (17) body, so they do not require much room.

While most goldfish can <u>put up with</u> poor water quality occasionally, it is important to note that (18)

they can produce a lot of waste. When the water quality is poor, it can <u>stunt</u> the fish's growth, often resulting in deformed appearances and death.


