#### Section C (8 m)

#### Comprehension

Under the midday sun, the orangutan looked like he was doing a rain dance with his arms stretched high towards the sky. Soon enough, the 'rain' did come, and he welcomed the cooling water with his mouth wide open. However, this shower was from a hose wielded by a zookeeper as a respite from the heat.

'Ice-based enrichment', or fruits and vegetables frozen in ice blocks, is also given to the animals to keep them mentally and physically engaged. Elephants use their trunks to drop these so that they would shatter into chunks of icy watermelon and carrots, making it easier for them to munch on the treats. Red river plgs bite into the ice blocks to get 10 to the honeydew slices.

Zookeepers carry out activities such as outdoor training in the earlier or later parts of the day when it is cooler. They also provide access to fresh water and shaded areas where the animals can sleep and rest. These areas are installed with fans to cool the animals down.

Orangutans have thick body coats while pigs and elephants do not have sweat glands, making them prone to overheating. Hence, zookeepers look out for signs of heat stress or a lack of appetite. They monitor these animals closely to ensure that they are coping well.
