Growing up, my childhood was filled with responsibilities that have moulded me into who I am today. Since young, I had to step up as I was the older child in the family. Because of my parents' lack of proficiency in English, there were countless times when I had to assist them with official matters. Whether it was making phone calls on their behalf or explaining the content of letters sent to them, I became their translator.

As hawkers, my parents worked long hours at the market. While they were toiling at work, I had to shoulder a huge responsibility that pushed me to be mature beyond my years. I was tasked to take care of my younger brother, Timmy.

Every day after school, I was expected to act like a second mother to Timmy. I would prepare my own lunch, do my homework and help my parents out with the household chores. In the evening, I would then head out to pick Timmy up from the student care centre. My parents could only afford to put one of us there and it was crucial for Timmy to have a place to go after school. Once home, I would help him catch up with his schoolwork. I seldom went out with my friends after school and rarely spent time doing what I liked. Seeing my friends who led carefree lives made me envious of them thus I resented my role as an older sister. These responsibilities entrusted to me felt more and more overwhelming.

One afternoon, Timmy's teacher called my parents who then instructed me to find out what had happened. My heart sank at the end of the conversation with his teacher. He had gotten into a fight at school. I rushed to his school ahead of my parents since they were still busy at the stall. While I hoped that Timmy was not injured, my mind was consumed with the fear of him being expelled from school. Taking my role very seriously, I had always felt burdened by the thought of meeting my parents expectation of being a good older sister. Would my parents think that I did not guide Timmy well? I felt as if I was forced into a tight corner, unable to breathe. I did not want to fail my parents.

Eventually, my parents turned up. The principal decided that Timmy would be suspended from school for a week and we had to make arrangements for his care during school hours. That evening, my parents were **visibly upset**. "Someone has to be home with him. I can't handle the stall on my own. And we can't afford to close our stall for a week," my father said to my mother. Seeing how troubled they were, I wanted to do something to make amends.

"I'll do it," I offered, unable to meet the gaze of my parents. Initially, they were hesitant to accept my suggestion. I would miss lessons and fall behind in my own work. After much deliberation, my parents made a difficult decision.

"Thank you," my mother said softly. "We can't do this without you. And this is not your fault." Hearing her words of gratitude warmed my heart. That was a turning point for me as I was reminded that I was valued. From then on, I was never bitter about a childhood full of responsibilities. Nor did I see my responsibilities as a burden. I realised they were opportunities for me to grow and support my family.

Looking back, I had my childhood experiences to thank for guiding me in my career. In my growing years, I had become more resilient and patient. With all that I had been through, as a counsellor, I am now able to better connect with teens and support those in need. Even if I could turn back the clock, I would not wish for a different childhood.

We all know the feeling. We get a strange tingly sensation on our skin when we feel a
