





Secondary school was challenging for me, but it taught me the meaning of seeing the light at the end of the tunnel. Secondary two was a unique year. In secondary one, I was below average in height but average in weight and athleticism, but during the summer break and before secondary two, my appetite became insatiable. Despite consuming large amounts of food, my hunger persisted. I was not concerned about it. I just assumed it was all caused by me working hard on a farm.

However, at the start of secondary two, I found myself feeling awkward and my clumsiness had reached the point where I could easily stumble over my own feet. To make matters worse, my trousers had become two sizes smaller after I put on seven kilogrammes.

My physical education teacher was shocked at my growth, exclaiming, "This can't be true! You've grown twelve centimetres in three months?" He remeasured my height several times before accepting and recording it.

While I grew taller, my self-confidence lagged behind. My shoe size jumped two sizes from size 9 to size 11 and my feet, seemingly with minds of their own, refused to coordinate with the rest of me.

During physical education lessons, I often tripped over my own feet while dribbling a basketball, causing me to fall amid the laughter of a few of my classmates. When I picked myself up and glared at them, they would flinch. I occasionally heard them whisper "Clumsy", especially when they thought I would not hear them, given my new size. I was way taller and bigger than all of them, which made them uneasy.

My greatest dread arrived – a month of dance practice in physical education to prepare for the School Bash Dance. I considered skipping school. But, what excuses could I give? I had no choice but to endure. I already felt inadequate in my social skills when it came to interacting with girls. The thought that my clumsiness would plunge my popularity rating even further gripped my heart with great trepidation.

After four dances, my partner limped away like the others before her. Then, the teacher said we would dance in socks. This must be done in consideration of sparing the girls from my big shoes. She looked right at me when announcing it, gave me a wink and a thumbs-up. She had been trying to convince me that effort was far more important than perfection.

We practised until The Day, which I feared would be my worst day. Partners were to be chosen, not assigned, with girls picking first. As they hurried to select, I braced to be the last boy standing. Soon, nearly all the boys were chosen.

I was looking down, so I did not have to face the events unfolding around me. Then I thought I heard my name and looked up to meet the gaze of a pair of bright eyes. She smiled kindly at me. She had to repeat herself before I realised she was speaking to me. As I timidly took her hand to escort her to the dance floor, I decided to warn her, "I don't dance very well."

She smiled warmly and replied, "That doesn't matter. I'm not a great dancer either. Let's give it our best shot together." 40

You know what? Secondary two was really **one of the best years of my life.**
