You will explore and appreciate how art and science shape our world!




Soapy Art

Venue: Techno Room, B1


Venture into the world of art and technology this holiday at the ScienceArt Museum. A half day camp with an interactive workshop and immersive play awaits you!

Ready, Get Set, Play!


6 - 8 March 2024
