The sun came in through a high window and shone on the highly polished taps. The prime minister hesitated. Then, he said, "Sometimes, I can help." Then he added, "Sometimes."

Raj looked down at the floor and squeezed his eyes shut as he realised the audacity of his question. Had he crossed some line of which he was unaware? Another man in a suit soon appeared. The prime minister whispered something to him. The man nodded, looked at Raj, and smiled.

At some point or another, perhaps during dinner at your neighborhood restaurant, you might have wondered how Asians could ever survive a meal without our delectable, umami-filled soy sauce.
