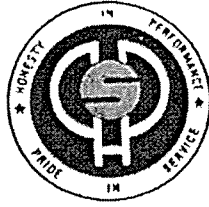

<p>It was a sunny afternoon in June 2022 when Anthony Perry got off the train at Summer Street station. The 20-year-old was on his way to meet his grandfather to look at a car he wanted to buy.</p>	
<p>On the platform, Perry saw two men fighting. Suddenly, they fell onto the train tracks. One man landed on his back while the other man, panicked, quickly clambered back onto the platform and ran away.</p>	5
<p>The man on the tracks had fallen onto the third rail - a dangerous rail that carries 600 volts of electricity to power the trains. He was convulsing as the electricity went through his body.</p>	
<p>"Help him!" a woman cried out. "Please, someone!"</p>	10
<p>Perry could not just watch. Without hesitation, he lowered himself onto the tracks. He had to be very careful because stepping on the electrified rail could prove fatal. Perry moved rapidly towards the man, using high steps like he did when playing football in high school. It worked and he made his way safely to the man.</p>	15
<p>The man looked badly hurt. His body was still shaking from the electricity. Perry knew he had to act fast before the next train arrived. Up on the platform, someone was calling the emergency hotline.</p>	
<p>Perry reached down to grab the man's wrist. Immediately, he felt an electric shock go through his own body. Gritting his teeth, he tried again and was electrocuted a second time. On his third try, Perry grabbed the man's arm and quickly pulled him away from the dangerous rail.</p>	20
<p>The trouble was not over yet. The man was breathing, but not normally. Noticing this, a woman shouted from the platform, "Give him chest compressions!"</p>	25
<p>Though anxious, Perry did his best to recall his past training as a first-aider. He carried out the chest compressions to keep the injured man alive. He also kept him from moving back onto the electrified rail.</p>	
<p>Soon, firefighters arrived and turned off the electricity to the third rail. They joined the paramedics to help get the man to safety. Perry let them take over. Satisfied with how he had helped the man, he climbed back onto the</p>	30

platform and quietly slipped away. He met up with his grandfather. Unfortunately, due to the delay, the car he wanted had already been sold.	
<p>Later, the newspaper reported the story of a hero who had saved a man's life. Perry's best friend, who had heard about the incident from him, was extremely proud. He revealed on social media that it was Perry, and Perry became famous in Chicago overnight. A kind, anonymous man gifted Perry a car to thank him for his brave act. The Chicago Firefighter Department presented Perry with a Medal of Valour for his exceptional bravery in the face of danger.</p> <p>"Why did you help when no one else did?" someone asked Perry.
