

I had long believed my primary school days had faded completely from memory. Yet, at a recent reunion with my former classmates, moments I thought were lost came rushing back.

One of the first faces that came to mind was Ah Huat, a close friend from those years. Life had dealt him such a difficult hand that it seemed he might have to leave school altogether. It was only through the determination of our young teacher, Miss Lim, that he was able to continue. She found a way for him to balance his lessons with the heavy responsibilities he carried at home. 5

Every evening, after returning from school, Ah Huat would sit beside his father and work late into the night making shoes. He was not allowed to sleep until several pairs were completed. The labour was repelitive and exhausting, leaving little energy for study. I remember a morning when we had a spelling test. Ah Huat arrived looking pale, his eyes dull with fatigue. When Miss Lim mentioned the test, his expression tightened and I could see the anxiety on his face. 10

Later that day, after the papers had been marked, Miss Lim summoned him to her desk. She scolded him for not spelling a single word correctly. At that point, the pressure seemed to engulf him. Ah Huat admitted, through tears, that the night before he had been forced to make twenty pairs of shoes before going to bed. His father, he explained, believed school was a waste of money and insisted Ah Huat work to help support the family. Miss Lim's face turned red. She paused before speaking again, telling him gently to use his time in school wisely and complete as much work as possible before heading home. She was still new to the school then and it was clear she was learning about the very different circumstances her students faced. 15

Another vivid memory from those days involved an incident that nearly landed me in serious trouble. A tall boy sat directly in front of me in class and his broad shoulders blocked my view of the blackboard. Each time I leaned to one side to catch a glimpse, he shifted deliberately to block me again. 20

One day, after enduring this for weeks, my frustration got the better of me. Without thinking, I jabbed my pencil into his back with such force that the lead snapped and remained lodged in his skin. The boy yelped, and Mr Tan, our teacher, was upon us in moments. Mr Tan saw red as he threatened to send me to the principal. Fear took hold of me and I gripped the wire mesh of the window, refusing to move. 25

After a tense standoff, Mr Tan sighed. He let the matter slide as he had seen enough of the boy's antics to understand my reaction. However, it did not excuse my behaviour. 30

Not long after, I found myself on the receiving end of a similar act. During a game in the school playground, another student, waving a pencil absentmindedly, turned at the exact moment I passed by. The tip pierced my skin, leaving a sharp sting followed by a trickle of blood. I let it go.

The wound healed but a small scar remains even now. It serves as a quiet reminder of how easily anger can lead to harm and how important it is to pause before acting. In those moments, the lesson is not simply about avoiding trouble; it is about recognising the humanity in others, understanding their struggles, and choosing patience over impulse. 35

Looking back, these two memories — Ah Huat's quiet resilience in the face of hardship and my own humbling experience of pain — stand out among the many half-forgotten days of childhood. They remind me that school was not only a place for learning subjects and passing exams but also a place where life taught us, in sometimes unexpected ways, the values of empathy, perseverance, and self-control. 40
