

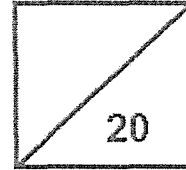

The North-East Line (NEL), the world's first fully-automated and driverless mass rapid transit line, opened in 2003. Plans for the NEL were first conceived in the 1980s and 1990s. It was quite challenging for the project team to come up with a (11) plan for an automated railway line that could carry thousands of people.

First, the operational master plan was developed. Next, the team looked into (12) how the rail system should operate and whether things would turn out as what had been planned and designed. One of the more difficult (13) tasks was to find out how to take care of passengers without a driver. The NEL thus became the first to have cameras installed (14) in the trains.

In addition, a strong operations control centre, which had the capability (15) to supervise, monitor and control the operations, needed to be built. Once this was established, it formed the basis for all other automated systems subsequently.

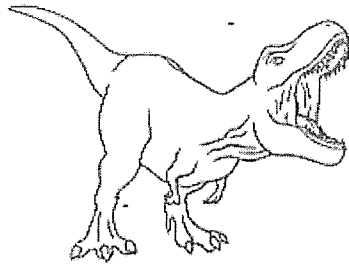

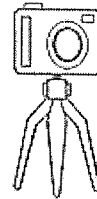

Famous Sculptors

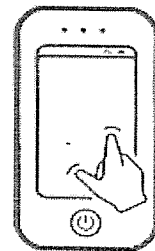

It was a warm Sunday with barely a cloud in sight. Ben was unwinding in his garden, watching the birds fly by. He had spent his weekend occupying himself with things that were not very important. His dog, Buddy, was playing energetically nearby, doing what dogs do in the garden - chewing, sniffing and getting into trouble. It loved nothing more than to nap in the shade. Ben remembered clearly that when he first set up a shady area in his garden, he had forgotten to consider Buddy's napping habits and planted some lily in its favourite spot. Before he could clean off his shovel, Buddy had plopped down on the new plant, squashing its bloom. However, this time, Buddy was getting into deeper trouble.

The **unmistakable sound** that no one wanted to hear when alone caught Ben's attention. He called out to Buddy. There was no response. All Ben could hear was the deep huffing and low growling of a black bear. Ben turned around quickly to see the beast, which he figured weighed around 350kg, shuffling some thirty metres away from him. Panic set in when he came face to face with the predator. Buddy was chewing on some grass in the other corner of the garden, oblivious to the impending danger. The bear pounded its front paws on the ground, a clear warning sign that it was agitated. Almost immediately, it charged straight at Ben and Buddy. Ben lunged forward, trying to grab Buddy but it was a futile attempt. The bear took a swipe at Ben. It managed to grab Buddy by the neck. Ben screamed and threw rocks at the bear but to no avail. The bear started dragging Buddy away.

Ben took off after them, worried that Buddy might not survive the brutal attack. Sprinting forth with all his might, he lowered his shoulders and ploughed into the bear. However, **this** only caused the bear to tighten its grip on Buddy. Ben grabbed the bear by the throat. Nothing happened. He tried to pry open its mouth, but the jaw was locked tight. Ben resorted to street fighting, pummelling the bear over and over around its snout and eye. The thought that he might lose his best friend spurred him to continue striking the bear repeatedly with his fists even though he was injured as well. It worked. The bear eventually dropped the dog and ran off into the woods.

Buddy was in bad shape. Its face was bleeding. It had a clear bite mark near its eye. Ben scooped Buddy up, put it in his car and sped off to a nearby veterinarian. Buddy's surgery took nearly four hours. Ben who suffered cuts and bruises watched the procedure through a window. "I just stood there," he said, watching as Buddy's ears were stitched back and tubes were inserted into his head to drain fluid.

"My first thought was that I was going to lose my companion," Ben later told a reporter. That was the second time Ben had rescued Buddy. The first was from an animal shelter a few years ago. "If it was your kid, what would you do?" he asked the reporter. He looked at Buddy before he added, "That's my kid."
