One evening, while checking on his grandfather, Kenji noticed something important. His grandfather slowly swung his legs over the side of the bed. A moment later, his feet pressed against the floor. Suddenly, an idea formed in Kenji's mind. If a device could detect that footstep, it could warn someone immediately. The moment his grandfather stood up, a signal could be sent to a phone, alerting the caregiver before he wandered away.	20
Excited by his idea, Kenji began researching how sensors worked. He quickly found that turning his idea into reality was not easy. He needed a sensor that was small and comfortable enough to wear. It took a long time to find the perfect one. Then, there was another uphill battle - he had to create a system that could send a wireless signal to a smartphone. The signal sometimes did not reach the phone even when the sensor was working fine. Some days, Kenji's father would find him poring over his notes, shoulders slumped. "Stuck again?" he would ask.
