The extract below is taken from an online article.

Wearing the right shoes is important for every runner whether they are experienced athletes or beginners. A shoe's weight is just one of several factors runners should consider. Good running shoes do more than keep the feet comfortable. They play a key role in helping runners perform well and in preventing injuries.

Firstly, proper running shoes provide strong support and sufficient cushioning. When a runner's feet hit the ground, the shoes help to absorb the impact. This reduces pressure on the feet, ankles and knees, making running safer. It also lowers the risk of common injuries such as sprains, muscle strain and joint pain.

In addition, running shoes are designed to help the body move correctly. They improve balance and support smoother, more controlled movements while running. With better stability and posture, runners can run for longer periods without discomfort.

- 1 In the ancient kingdom of Tiwana, two cousins, Trev and Dev, trained under the kingdom's most respected sculptor, Master Govin. Although they trained together from a young age, they were very different. Trev's extraordinary natural talent quickly earned him the admiration of visitors but years of praise had made him proud. He became dismissive of weaker apprentices and was determined to prove he was the best. He was unbothered by the words and feelings of others. Dev, however, lacked Trev's natural brilliance. His early sculptures were rough and uneven but he was patient and hardworking. Whenever Master Govin corrected him, Dev listened carefully. He observed experienced craftsmen, practised tirelessly and gradually improved. 5
 - 2 One summer, the King of Tiwana announced a competition to select a sculpture for the new Hall of Wisdom. The winner would receive a royal title and a chest of gold. While many sculptors saw it as a chance to showcase their skills, Trev saw this as an opportunity to earn fame. 10
 - 3 Ignoring Master Govin's advice to focus on the craft rather than recognition, Trev chose a huge slab of marble and began carving a towering warrior dressed in elaborate armour. His sculpture was designed to impress. Dev took a different approach. Before touching his tools, he spent several days travelling through villages and marketplaces, observing ordinary people. He watched labourers working under the scorching sun and parents caring for their children. Inspired by what he had seen, he decided to sculpt an elderly farmer carrying a tired child on his shoulders. 15
 - 4 As the weeks passed, Trev worked hastily. Whenever cracks or uneven surfaces appeared, he concealed them under carvings instead of repairing them properly. Trev was only concerned with the sculpture's appearance. He paid little attention to its durability. "People will regard my work highly no matter what," he said to himself, smirking with pride. Meanwhile, Dev worked steadily. Rather than focussing on impressing others, he carefully carved the farmer's weathered hands, tired posture and gentle expression. His sculpture was simple but every detail reflected patience and care. When visitors entered the workshop to watch them work, they gravitated towards Trev's spectacular warrior. Seeing this, Trev mocked his cousin's ordinary subject. "Your sculpture is not getting you anything. Your common man pales in comparison to my towering warrior," he scoffed. "Sometimes," Dev replied calmly, "ordinary things are what matter most." 20
 - 5 Finally, the day of judgement arrived. The palace courtyard was filled with spectators who were excited to find out which sculpture would make it to the Hall of Wisdom. Both sculptures had their own set of admirers. The judges decided to assess Trev's sculpture first. However, just as they were inspecting it, a faint crack echoed through the courtyard. Moments later, a large fracture spread across the statue's chest before both of its arms broke away. Trev's face turned beetroot red and he lowered his head as the broken pieces lay scattered across the ground. The hidden flaws he had covered up had finally been exposed. Later that afternoon, the judges announced Dev as the winner. Although his sculpture lacked grandeur, it moved everyone. The judges praised the patience, craftsmanship and understanding reflected in every detail. 25
 - 6 That evening, Trev returned to the workshop and studied Dev's sculpture. For the first time, he noticed the warmth in the farmer's eyes, the careful shaping of his worn hands and the quiet beauty that could only come from patience. Seeing that, realisation finally dawned on him; it was never just about the end result. Master Govin then came into the workshop and reminded him, "Young man, the competition has never been about producing the most impressive sculpture. It was about becoming the kind of sculptor capable of creating one." 30
- From that day on, Trev understood that his greatest failure had not been losing the competition but believing that success was measured by recognition alone. Years later, people no longer remembered the royal prize. Instead, they remembered the sculptor who had allowed the journey to shape both his masterpiece and his character. 45

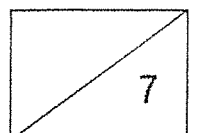

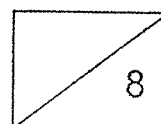
